


Most Popular Versions Sold

- 1. New International Version
- 2. King James Version
- 3. New Living Translation
- 4. New King James Version
- 5. English Standard Version



What is the version or translation of the Bible you read most often?



Based on Functional Equivalence or <u>Literal (Word-for-Word)</u> here are the 5 <u>most accurate</u> translations of the Bible:

1. The New American Standard Bible (NASB) was first published in 1963, with the most recent edition published in 1995. It holds the reputation for being the "most accurate" Bible translation in English.

2. English Standard Version (ESV)

The ESV is a revision of the Revised Standard Version (RSV). It is also very close to the NASB. It was originally published in 2001. A new edition was published in 2009 including the deuterocanonical –or apocryphal- books. This makes it suitable for reading for Catholic believers.

3. New English Translation (NET)

The NET was first published in 2005, and it is a completely new version. It is a free online Bible and it can be accessed at this link. It was designed as a free online version of the Bible for worldwide ministry so that people who do not have access to the Bible could have a high-quality resource for Bible study.

4. King James Version (KJV)

That venerable old standard –the King James Version (KJV) also shows up very high on the list of most accurate Bibles. But what holds it back from being higher on the list? The English is 400 years old, dating to the original publishing date of 1611. Our language has changed greatly since the KJV was published 4 centuries ago so it doesn't get to the top of the list when measured by today's standards.


5. New King James Version (NKJV)

The NKJV –the New King James Version- is a beautifully updated version of the KJV. It retains the beautiful structure and literary qualities of the KJV, but just enough of the antiquated words are changed into modern English words that the reader's understanding is greatly improved.

What American Read

A study published in 2014 by The Center for the Study of Religion and American Culture at Indiana University and Purdue University found that <u>Americans read versions</u> of the Bible as follows:

- 1. King James Version (55%)
- 2. New International Version (19%)
- 3. New Revised Standard Version (7%)
- 4. New American Bible (6%)
- 5. The Living Bible (5%)
- 6.All other translations (8%)
